



WHAT IS THE IMAGINATION LIBRARY?

A monthly home delivered book program for children from 0-5 years old, free of charge to families.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO JOIN?

Children who are 0 to 3 years old, currently living in Charnwood, Dunlop, Holt, Higgins, Latham or MacGregor and have been invited to enrol by partner organisations.

WHY IS READING WITH MY CHILD **IMPORTANT?**

Reading to your child from a young age will help their language development and assist them to develop the skills to read themselves as they get older.

One book a month delivers major ripple effect

CLARISSA David's three boys race to the mailbox every month to check for their next book delivery.

The family has been part of the Information Library Kippax program since it launched last year. Each month, children aged from birth to five get a free, age-appropriate book alongside a tip sheet for

"It's part of the daily night bedtime tradition to do the reading, a couple of books before bedtime. It's really good," Mrs David said.

"My kids are always excited to open our mailbox to see there's some books in there."

The program was started by Dolly Parton's charity, the Dollywood Foundation, but has since spread all over Galea said.

New research has shown the initiative not only boosts early literacy skills, but also builds connections between a family due to receiving parents and their children.

Macquarie University PhD candidate and United Way Australia statistician Claire Galea led two studies into the program's impact. The first surveyed caregivers in Tamworth at the start of the program, after six months and after three years.

It found children in Tamworth were being read to more often, for longer durations and had more books in the home than the average Australian child.

"Seventy-six per cent of children in Tamworth have more than 25 books, and the average [in Tamworth] is 44. It's just amazing to see that kind of result," Mrs

The study found 85 per cent of caregivers felt more connected to their child and spent more quality time as the books.

"Fathers didn't know what to do with the newborn, but they could read a book," Mrs they start school and their Galea said.

"I think it was a collective improvement for the whole family. As their literacy improves, their confidence improves and they connect to the child. It's much more than just a child getting emerging literacy skills."

The results were replicated in an international survey MacGregor, Higgins and of 86,000 families in Canada, Ireland, the UK, Australia and the US. Children on the program were more likely to be read to often and Primary School. The suburbs demonstrate early literacy skills compared to children not on the program.

After 12 months on the program, children were more than eight times more likely to be interested in books.

Mrs Galea is working to expand the Tamworth study to check in with children as first year of NAPLAN in year 3. She hopes the early intervention will boost literacy skills in primary school.

The Imagination Library Kippax program has noticed similar success since a pilot program began in October

Families living in Holt, Latham can be referred into the program through a network of community organisations and Evatt were chosen because they had higher levels of development vulnerability on the

Australian Early Development Census.

Now, 155 children from 125 families are receiving monthly book deliveries.

A Village for Every Child manager Hemali Gunawar dana said sending the book with the child's name on it to the family home overcomes the challenges of coming to a collection point.

"The books come for the kids. They have ownership of the book, and it creates those meaningful opportunities for other family members to be part of that routine," she said.

"The book is just the start, but there are ripple effects.'

Ms Gunawardana said the program was cost-effective at only \$9 per child per month. However, after the seed funding runs out, more funding will be required to
